## **SURVIVING THE TITANIC - MARGARET "MOLLY" BROWN**

**Janet Kalstrom**, Interpreter, is a retired professional after 37 years in the corporate world. She is now enjoying opportunities to continue her love of learning and experiencing Colorado history through travel and docent activities. At a popular Denver museum she interprets a significant Colorado woman, Margaret Brown. She has enjoyed her multiple roles at the museum over the last seven years. These events have taken her locally in Denver and outlying areas, remote Colorado cities and even internationally. Her primary passion is to provide a true experience to her audience through the eyes of another time where women were laying the ground work for the future of education, equal rights, women rights, and the pioneer struggles of the west.

### Presentation Synopsis:

A first person interpretation of the survival of Titanic on April 15, 1912 through the eyes of the Unsinkable Margaret "Molly" Brown. She not only will take you back to that fatal night but take you on the journey of how it changed her life going forward. She lived a significant part of her life in Colorado and left a footprint in history that is still remembered today through her home - The Molly Brown House Museum in Denver, Colorado. Come prepared to go back in time 104 years.

## **THE LONELY HEARTS CLUB: CORRESPONDENCE ADS DURING THE CIVIL WAR AND THE PROCESS OF RESEARCH**

**Dr. Patricia Richard** is an Associate Professor at Metropolitan State University of Denver.

### Presentation Synopsis:

The wartime environment allowed few opportunities for the "boys in blue" to meet honorable women and they hoped to remedy their situation through correspondence requests. This presentation will reveal the process of research and discovery in 19<sup>th</sup> century newspapers while examining the humorous and gentle sides of the soldiers, their middle-class values and their desire for civility as found in Civil War correspondence ads.

### Presentation Synopsis:

This presentation will provide an overview of the publishing process. Topics will include developing a project, finding a publisher, and working with an editor. Time permitting, the session will also allow for attendees to share experiences with each other.

## THE MINTING OF A COMMEMORATIVE COIN - A LONG JOURNEY

### Presentation Synopsis:

This presentation is about what was entailed in getting a bill written into law to enable the United States Mint to create a commemorative silver dollar coin to honor the veterans of World War I. The bill was signed by President Obama in December of 2014 and the coin will be minted in 2018.

We will discuss how coins are primary historical documents and how commemorative coins have been minted to honor specific moments in history.

## JOE THE PLUMBER: THE STORY OF MICROHISTORY

**Karen Dropps** is the founder of Front Range Museum Consulting in Louisville, CO, where we consult with museums on oral history projects. She received my masters from Regis College in Weston, MA in 2014 in Heritage Studies for a Global Society. Her thesis focused on Adam Capen

Jr. a man who lived in Stoughton MA in the late 19th century, and comparing his day books to that of what the local newspaper was reporting. Karen's passion for history has been the people who are missed in the big history books. She loves exploring the lives of those before us be it through interview, journals, or piecing together their lives from the scraps left behind. Understanding the average citizen helps us understand the big events in history, though they are usually forgotten.

Presentation Synopsis:

Microhistory is an under used skill for the historian. Explore a project that looks at the life of Adam Capen Jr.; how his journals and local sources help paint a picture of who the man was, and what life was like in the late 19th century. Learn how microhistory can help shed light on the average citizen, Joe the plumber, and the community in which they belonged.

## **BUFFALO BILL: SCOUT, SHOWMAN, VISIONARY**

**Steve Friesen** ([steve.friesen@denvergov.org](mailto:steve.friesen@denvergov.org)) is the Director of the Buffalo Bill Museum and Grave since 1995 and has served at various museums since 1976. He has an MA in American Folk Culture. Steve has authored two books, "A Modest Mennonite Home" (about Pennsylvania German colonial life) and "Buffalo Bill: Scout, Showman, Visionary," (an illustrated biography of Buffalo Bill). His newest book "I Am Not A Savage!", about American Indian show performers in Europe is slated to be available from University of Oklahoma Press in early 2017.

Presentation Synopsis:

This presentation is about the life of famous frontiersman and showman Buffalo Bill, illustrated with photos and images of artifacts in the collection of the Buffalo Bill Museum and Grave on Lookout Mountain.

## **THE POLITICS OF COINAGE; MESSAGES ON EARLY MODERN COINS**

**Douglas Mudd** ([dmudd@money.org](mailto:dmudd@money.org)) has a BA International Relations, College of William & Mary and a MA American History, George Mason University. As the son of an American diplomat, Doug spent his early years living abroad, beginning in Lima, Peru. His childhood homes included

---

Taiwan, the Philippines, Bolivia, Syria, and Mexico before finishing high school in Arlington, Virginia. After completing his BA in International Relations at the College of William and Mary in 1985, he began working at the Smithsonian Institution. In 1991, he was hired as Collection Manager for the National Numismatic Collection, located in the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History. Doug completed his MA in American History in May, 2004 at George Mason University. In June of 2004, he took the position of Curator of the ANA Money Museum in Colorado Springs, where he has prepared many exhibits, articles and presentations, including the current exhibit: Olympic Games; History & Numismatics. Doug is also the author of "All the Money in the World" published by Harper/Collins under the Smithsonian imprint in October of 2006.

Presentation Synopsis:

Money is anything that people will accept as payment in exchange for other goods. It has had many uses over the ages beyond its original development for purposes of long distance trade and military power. Among them is as a means of communication through the designs and legends on coins. A nation's money is often the first impression a visitor gets of the nature of a country. As such, the designs and legends placed on money have always been considered important by the authorities responsible for their issue.

This presentation will discuss the messages that appear on early modern European coinage from the 13th century through the early 19th century in a series of case studies. From simple declarations of independence and power to more subtle messages conveying complex political concepts, early modern European coins reflect the legacy left by the ancient world in a rich numismatic pageant.

Presentation Synopsis:

This presentation will present and analyze the response of the Denver Fire Department to over 150 years of historic and cultural change, beginning with the Department's formation in 1866. Topics include the transition from horses to motorized fire apparatus, the inclusion of women in the fire department, and changes in fire station architecture.

## **STRONG SISTERS: ELECTED WOMEN IN COLORADO**

**Meg Froelich and Laura Hoepfner** ([strongsistersdoc@gmail.com](mailto:strongsistersdoc@gmail.com)) Meg has produced documentaries for PBS and A&E including American Masters, American Experience and Biography episodes. She has a Masters in History from the University of Michigan.

Laura also has a Masters in History from the University of Michigan where the two met. She has been the City of Centennial Community and Government Affairs Liaison as well as the Executive Director of the Legislative Women's Caucus in Colorado. [www.strongsisters.org](http://www.strongsisters.org)

Presentation Synopsis:

Presenting the findings of their three year project about Colorado's unique history of electing women from 1893 (when women won the right to vote and promptly elected three women to the legislature) to the present (where we lead the nation in percentage of women in the legislature). By conducting 75 interviews with past and current legislators, journalists and

---

historians we asked Why Colorado? What difference does it make? Why no female Governor or US Senator?

## **TITANIC, THE COLORADO CONNECTION**

**Phillip L. Kleppen** became a member of The Titanic History Society in April 1998 after getting interested in Titanic during the summer of 1995 and doing his own research. He began to attend their annual conventions and meet others who were passionate about the Titanic. At the beginning of 2003 he became a docent at the Molly Brown House Museum until early 2005 when he moved to Kansas City, Kansas. Phillip worked with the Museum on a few different projects until the summer of 2011 when he moved back to Denver and started doing tours again. Living in Colorado has given Phillip the drive to find any local connections to the Titanic.

### Presentation Synopsis:

Most people know about Margaret (the Unsinkable Molly) Brown and that she lived in Denver, Colorado. What most people do not know is that there are several other passengers who were on the ill-fated maiden voyage of Titanic.

## **DISCOVERING THE CONNECTIONS BETWEEN THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPEDITION'S CORPS OF DISCOVERY AND THE WAR OF 1812**

**Lorna Hainesworth** travels around the continental United States visiting historical sites to supplement historical research, which is incorporated into papers and presentations. She serves as an ambassador for several organizations including Surveyors Historical Society, Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation, Historic National Road Associations, Maryland Historical Society, Friends of Fort McHenry, Lewis and Clark Trust, Inc. and others.

### Presentation Synopsis:

This presentation discusses several members of the Lewis and Clark Expedition's Corps of Discovery whose service in the War of 1812 is fairly well documented or corps members who had significant life experiences

---

during the period of the War of 1812, which is defined as beginning with the 1807 Embargo Act and ending with the Treaties at Portage des Sioux. It also addresses persons closely associated with Lewis and Clark who had significant War of 1812 experiences. Slides shown during the presentation will include modern-day maps and photos of some of the places where corps members served.

## **SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION PATRIOT CHEST**

**Steve DeBoer** and **David Mann** have both served as State Presidents of the 120 year old Colorado Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and are involved with the SAR Patriot Chest program in front range schools and adult venues.

The SAR is a genealogy society comprised of the living descendants of members of the Continental Line, Colonial militia or Patriot founders and supporters.

### Presentation Synopsis:

This will be a quick overview of the founding of the United States and background of the Revolutionary War using history, anecdotal stories and artifacts from a soldier's viewpoint.

The Presentations have been given over 200 times now to groups from fifth graders completing their Colonial lesson plans, to Veterans groups and college classes on early America.

## **MEDAL OF HONOR: GENERAL WALKER'S DISAPPEARANCE ON JANUARY 5, 1943**

**Madison Jonas** ([madison@irandpcorp.com](mailto:madison@irandpcorp.com)) is an editor, researcher and office manager at International Historical Research Associates. Though new to the field, he found himself fascinated by the story of the 43rd Bomb Group, and eventually became an associate author of Volume I of their unit history: *Ken's Men Against the Empire: The B-17 Era*. <http://irandpcorp.com/>

### Presentation Synopsis:

On the morning of January 5th, 1943, 1/Lt. Jean A. Jack led a two-plane recon flight of B-17s over Rabaul, New Britain one of the most heavily guarded Japanese bases in the Southwest Pacific. Six hours later, they were followed by Gen. Kenneth N. Walker, Fifth Air Force Bombing Commander, leading twelve heavy bombers on a daylight bombing mission over the same base. They were attempting to disrupt a vital convoy assembling in its harbor, slated to carry over 4000 soldiers to New Guinea for a renewed offensive against Wau. Both Jack and Walker lost their aircraft to enemy fighter interception. And while Jean Jack and his crew were rescued the next day, Walker disappeared, fate unknown. The convoy, meanwhile, slipped out of the harbor nearly untouched. But what really happened to General Walker's B-17, the SAN ANTONIO ROSE, after it lost contact with the other 64th Squadron aircraft? This illustrated presentation will discuss the mission and its place in the New Guinea campaign, along with the investigation into the possible fate of the SAN ANTONIO ROSE.

## **ROYAL GENEALOGY AND TERRITORY OF AN ANCIENT MIXTEC KINGDOM IN OAXACA, MEXICO**

**Stephen L. Whittington** ([director@mininghalloffame.org](mailto:director@mininghalloffame.org)) has been Executive Director of the National Mining Hall of Fame and Museum in Leadville, Colorado since 2014. Before that, he was Director of the Hudson Museum at the University of Maine and the Museum of Anthropology at Wake Forest University. He earned his PhD at Pennsylvania State University and has directed archaeological projects in Honduras, Guatemala, and Mexico since the 1980s. ### Presentation Synopsis:

A Mixtec artist painted the famous Mapa de Teozacoalco in the late 1570s to support a lawsuit in colonial Oaxaca. The document lays out the contemporary territory of the town of San Pedro Teozacoalco and the royal genealogy of Chiyo Ca'nu, a kingdom that existed in that territory in pre-Hispanic times. Authorities submitted the map to the Spanish crown in 1580 as part of their response to a series of 50 questions about municipalities in New Spain. Since 2000, archaeologists have been exploring the territory shown on the map to learn what it reveals about the ancient and colonial history of a region of Oaxaca, Mexico.

---

## DENVER'S BRICK SEWERS: PRIVY'S BE GONE!

**Gail Keeley** is a City Planner and Historian President /Owner of Hermesen Consultants, a consulting firm providing historic resource assessments for transportation projects for over 30 years. She received her MS Urban and Regional Planning from University of Colorado – Denver and her BS Regional Planning and Environmental Studies from the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay. She is a user of sewers every day.

### Presentation Synopsis:

Who would have thought Denver's first sewers were built of brick? In 1880, after 20 years of urban growth, with only outhouses and cesspools to handle human waste, it was clear a long term solution was needed. Brick was the most durable building material of the time and so it was used to build the first sewers. Teams of oxen carried in the bricks and skilled brick masons built the earliest sewers with up to four layers of concentric bricks in round and oval shapes. Come and find out the politics that led to their construction, where those sewers were and how many of them are still in operation today.

**Julie Miller**, Certified Genealogist, Fellow of the National Genealogical Society ([julie@jpmresearch.com](mailto:julie@jpmresearch.com)) is a professional researcher, lecturer, and writer who lives in Broomfield, Colorado. **Carriers of News and Knowledge: Post Office Records** - Post Office Records are full of riches. This presentation will discuss Post Office records, their contents, and how to access these underutilized records.

## ENGLEWOOD COLORADO'S AMAZING HISTORY

**Douglas Cohn** is a Denver native, graduate of Englewood High School, the University of Colorado and the Denver Seminary. He fell in love with Colorado history when he first saw *The Face on the Barroom Floor* in 8th grade. He is active in the Englewood Historic Preservation Society and the Rocky Mountain Railroad Heritage Society. His family business was Bonnie Brae Hobby Shop which closed last year after 53 good years. He has been very active in the local Englewood politics.

### Presentation Synopsis:

From gold being found in 1858, to the first suburban mass transit, the airplane company, the factory with more than 300 patents, to the cutting edge companies today - Englewood has always attracted people with big ideas and the will to succeed.

## DENVER'S AMUSEMENT PARKS: A STORY OF FUN

**David Forsyth** ([david.forsyth@colorado.edu](mailto:david.forsyth@colorado.edu)) is a Colorado native and historian with a strong interest in amusement parks and their history. He is also executive director and curator of the Gilpin Historical Society in Central City.

### Presentation Synopsis:

Almost 5,000 amusement parks were built in the United States between 1895 and 1920, with most major cities having at least one. By 1908, Denver's residents had been lucky enough to have five amusement parks in

---

their city. After 1914, only two - Lakeside and Elitch's - remained to entertain tens of thousands of customers yearly until two new ventures in the 1950s threatened their dominance. Join historian David Forsyth for a trip through this rollercoaster history of Denver's amusement parks.

## **EVERYDAY STUFF - EXTRAORDINARY PEOPLE: RESOURCES AT THE DENVER PUBLIC LIBRARY**

**James K. Jeffrey** ([jjeffrey@denverlibrary.org](mailto:jjeffrey@denverlibrary.org)) is Collection Specialist in Local History and Genealogy at Denver Public Library. Recipient of the P. William Filby Award for Excellence in Genealogical Librarianship from the National Genealogical Society; he is past president of Colorado Council of Genealogical Societies and the Society of Rocky Mountain Archivists.

### Presentation Synopsis:

Special collections conjures up images of acid free folders, white gloves and beady eyed archivists! The reality is much better. On a daily basis we encounter researchers who have traveled across town or the globe to see what we have treasured away in Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library and in Western History and Genealogy. They arrive in person or electronically to peruse slave manumissions, church records, miners' diaries, newspapers, Chicano movement oral histories, LGBT materials and much more. They explore the everyday realities of ordinary people whose legacies reveal extraordinary lives and transcendent events.

## **CASELLS AMONG THE PINES: A ONCE RENOWNED BUT NOW FORGOTTEN GRAND RESORT IN THE COLORADO ROCKIES**

**Larry Bell** is fiercely proud of being a fourth-generation native of Colorado and passionate about preserving its history. As an amateur genealogist, historian and researcher, he has spent countless hours over the past thirty years learning about the places in Colorado that have special meaning to his family. He's currently giving retirement a trial run after spending fifty years in music, supply chain management, and software training and sales demonstrations.

---

### Presentation Synopsis:

For over fifty years, from 1878 until 1930, Cassells flourished as "the oldest and grandest of the Platte Canyon resorts". This presentation details its origins as a homestead, growth, glory days, survival after a devastating fire, eventual decline and closure. It will also briefly discuss how it then became the well-known institution that has continuously occupied the site in the eighty-six years since Cassells closed.

## **COLORADO'S WILDLIFE HISTORY**

**Jeff Rucks** is retired from Colorado Parks and Wildlife where he served as a wildlife officer, a wildlife manager and biologist, and Manager of Education and Outreach. He currently trains wildlife professionals and naturalists on presentation skills and education techniques. For the past five years he has been doing presentations and programs for The Wildlife Experience at CU South. He has been a resident of Colorado for 40 years and currently lives in Parker, Colorado. He enjoys exploring Colorado hiking, skiing, camping, and biking across the state with his wife Denise.

### Presentation Synopsis:

Colorado's human history is closely tied to its wildlife history. From beaver trappers to market hunters to a remarkable story of wildlife recovery, the story of Colorado's rich history must include our relationship to the wild animals of this state. The presentation will have interesting stories of how people have impacted wildlife and how wildlife has influenced our history.
